Tenebrae (meaning 'darkness' or 'shadows') is a prayer of the church during the Triduum. This adaptation of the Liturgy of Tenebrae includes seven readings relating the story of Jesus' passion and death. After each reading a candle is extinguished, followed by a prayer and sung response. The service ends with the "Christ candle" being carried out, leaving the church in darkness. Join us for this moving and inspirational Lenten service.
