

Advent!- How prepared are we?

This special time of every year reminds us of the oncefor-all-times birth of Jesus and our faith that He will come again at the end of time... We celebrate God's inbreak then, now and in an unknown future time. "As the new liturgical year begins, it is not without a remembrance of the passing year. On this, the first Sunday of Advent, the lectionary selections bring to a climax the themes featured in the last weeks of the old year. Concerned with the eschata or last things - the end of time, the final judgment, the reward of the just and retribution for the evil - the passing year left in its wake the theme of the second, definitive coming of the Son of Man. On the second Sunday of Advent, the focus shifts to the first coming of the Son of Man and the themes of incarnation, messianism, etc.... [The] faithful are drawn to focus on Advent's true concerns, the comings of Jesus, incarnate and risen. During Advent the realities of the first coming and of the final coming dovetail; Advent hope anticipates and prepares, not for a baby, earthly lesus but for a risen and exalted Christ who will judge all people. These themes of judgment and justice are featured in today's readings."
