#### Solemnity of Mary, Holy Mother of God

First Reading Numbers 6:22-27 (18ABC)

**Psalm** Psalm 67:2-3, 5, 6, 8

#### **About today's Solemnity**

Today, the Church celebrates Mary as the Mother of God. She is called *Theotokos* ("God-bearer"), for "God sent his son, born of a woman" (Gal 4:4). Because Mary found favor with God, his Son took the flesh of Mary – it is thanks to her that Jesus is *fully* human, with flesh like ours, except for sin, and also fully divine.....

Mary keeps everything, reflecting in her heart. What must it be like to be Mary, witnessing this incredible unfolding of God's Plan? Read the second chapter of Luke. Imagine yourself experiencing these things as Mary does. What do you see, smell, feel, touch, taste? We see in Mary a model of contemplation. She saw God's presence in her life, and she responded by meditating on it, giving it her focus and attention. Of course, God was acting in her life in a way that was completely different, completely new. But God also acts in each of our lives, in a way that is unique, our own call to holiness. Spend a few minutes in silence, looking at your day and finding God's presence there. What is God doing in your life right now?

# From the Loft

#### LESSONS FROM A BLIZZARD

The holidays are met with anticipation about seeing our families. Some of it good - and some of it not so good. Like many of you, we've been playing with work and travel and weather to make plans for our celebrations. One granddaughter won't be home until a couple of days after Christmas so that she can visit her fiance's family; another will not be here because of the snowstorm. She couldn't leave early due to her work schedule. Our grandson is excited but also disappointed because for the first time his sister won't be here and his mother could not get here either. Of course, Wegman's and Amazon would have us believe that if we just shop there and get together more - we will be happy. If you wear your L.L. Bean flannel shirt, you will be comfortable, and, if only Amazon had been around, Romeo and Juliet's families would have had a great time partying together. But even Wegman's and Tops are closed as I write this. One of my favorite feasts in the Church is the Feast of the Holy Family. This year, since there is no Sunday between Christmas and New Year's Day, the feast falls on Friday, December 30.

When we talk about the Holy Family, we often imagine a "perfect" family. Perfection is a pretty difficult model for us to follow. I've seen some comments on Facebook about the birth of Jesus that some believe to be sacrilegious. One shows St. Joseph trying to get his wife to speak to him. Apparently, she is a bit upset that he didn't "make a reservation." Another speaks of what Mary went through giving birth alone, wondering about how she would have felt, nursing a newborn — with no help from family. Surely Mary and Joseph were sometimes tired, worried, and confused. Didn't they "lose" Jesus only to find him teaching in the temple? Maybe Mary misplaced a coin like the woman in the parable. If Joseph were a poor carpenter, Mary would have turned the house "upside down" to find the coin.

Christmas came without the last-minute trip to the store and without the pageantry (though wonderful) of Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Masses. Perhaps a blizzard at Christmas will remind us of those things that we should learn from the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph: Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Do these sound familiar? They should be familiar to anyone who has been Confirmed. These are the fruits of the Holy Spirit. May you receive these gifts this year and use them wisely in the new year.
