

As we hear the words of Isaiah the Prophet this weekend, it is a good reminder that ALL baptized individuals, like Isaiah, are "formed from the womb" to be God's servants. 

KNOW YOUR FAITH

What's on your list?

I make lists. I put things on lists I have already finished so I can cross them off. (It is a psychological trick that helps me deal with having a lot to do.) My family thinks that it is funny. I like a plan - a pathway and a goal. I want to know where I am going. As usual, I made many lists around the holidays, and, as the wind howled outside, I crossed off one plan after another. Until, very early on Christmas morning, with nearly all of my carefully laid plans blown away, I looked out the window at the peaceful stillness all around us. "Be still and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46:10) It was as clear as the bells of Christmas 1863, that reminded the poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow "God is not dead, nor doth He sleep; The Wrong shall fail, The Right prevail, With peace on earth, good-will to men." (Wikipedia)

Pope Francis has a list, too. His list is a "New Year's Resolution" list. If I were to summarize this list, it might be said that we should live life on purpose. Life on Purpose is the theme for Part One of our Confirmation program, but its lessons apply to all of us.

Let's take a look at what Pope Francis has to say. His "resolutions" speak particularly to this principle. Here are some of them. The first lesson of Living Life on Purpose is to "Trust in God." That does not mean living life on a whim or without thought. Perhaps, it means just the opposite.

- Number 9 is "Make it a habit to ask the Lord." Prayer is familiar to all of us, but do we really listen for the answer? Is the answer always what we want it to be? God asks, "Will you let me answer prayer in you and you in me?" (The Summons, written by David Peacock, Graham Maule, and John Bell, 1987) Pope Francis quotes 1 Samuel 3:1-10, "Speak, Lord, for I am listening.' ... You too can ask the Lord: What do you want me to do? What path am I to follow?"
- Number 3 is to make time for others. In much of our studies on evangelization we have learned that the biggest factor in bringing people to God through the Church is our relationships with each other. This will be even more true as we begin to work more intentionally with other parishes.
- Number 8 is to make commitments. He speaks directly about marriage, but if we are to trust the Lord who honors his covenant with Abraham and the covenant through Jesus shouldn't we be able to be trusted? What does it say about us if we are always waiting for something "better" to come along?
- In number 7 he asks us to befriend those with whom we disagree. This will certainly be a handy one to keep as we move forward in our renewal journey. Really listen to what others say. Sometimes a disagreement is not so much about the little thing being discussed but the "self" that seems to be getting lost in the process.

 Number 6 is to stop judging others: "If we, each doing our own part, if we do good to others, if we meet there, doing good, and we go slowly, gently, little by little, we will make that culture of encounter: we need that so much. We must meet one another doing good."

In today's Psalm response, we echo the sentiments of Samuel, "Here I am, Lord; I come to do your will." (Ps 40:9) This weekend, our country celebrates Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s legacy of non-violent peaceful activism toward a society free from racism, prejudice, and inequality. His life was shaped by the commitment made by his parents and his early experiences with travel in the northern states. He reported back to his parents that blacks were eating alongside white patrons in restaurants and sitting next to each other on public transportation. I am quite certain that this experience was not everything that we would want it to be, but it was an impetus for his early career choices. His study of ethics and religion further shaped his actions. Many of the celebrations this weekend will include invitations to volunteer days of service. That was not the legacy of King. His legacy was as a community organizer for the betterment and fair treatment of all people through peaceful means. We can do similarly if we follow those principles set forth in our Pope's New Year's Resolutions: Make time for people, Pray, Make commitments, Listen, and Be friendly. Could it really be this simple?
