As Christians, we are challenged to consider that at the heart of our BEING we are rooted in Christ and his way. This coming week might be the perfect opportunity to consider especially one or two of the beatitudes and how we might bring them more fully into a more conscious awareness of their presence and power in our inner lives. We could certainly use some large doses of things like being "clean of heart" or full of "peace." For those who choose to live their God-given "being," Jesus announces, "Rejoice and be glad for your reward will be great in heaven!"

One of these things is not like the other

I am a big fan of Sesame Street, and I have seen a lot of it! Sesame Street premiered when one of my younger brothers was a preschooler, I watched through high school and college with an even younger brother and then with our children and two of our grandchildren. There was a game that they played with a song that goes something like this: "One of these things is not like the others? Some of these things are kind of the same. Can you tell which one is not like the others, before I finish this song?"

We've been playing a similar game during our scripture study. As you know, the lectionary (the book with all the readings used at Sunday liturgies) is on a three-year repeating cycle. Each of the three years we read a different synoptic Gospel. "Synoptic" means to see with one eye. The Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke are called synoptic because they have so many similarities. They are so similar that many scripture experts believe that Matthew and Luke used Mark and another document as their primary source. This year we are reading from *Matthew*. During the Lent and Easter seasons, we read from the Gospel of John. What makes "John" different from the other three Gospels?

The Gospel of John was written by one or possibly more authors toward the end of the first century. Though it was traditionally said to be written by John, the son of Zebedee, that is now believed to be unlikely. Given the time the book was written and its style, the author was probably not a witness, but had information from eye witnesses. Interestingly, the book is not strictly in chronological order. In this book, there is a greater emphasis on both the divinity and the eternal existence of Jesus. When you enter Blessed Trinity church and face the sanctuary, look up and you will see words that come directly from John. "In the beginning was the Word" and "the Word was made flesh." This is very different language from that of the other writers who seek to connect Jesus to the Messiah of the Hebrew scriptures. The Gospel is said to be "highly literal and symbolic" - a well-developed theology (study of God.) There are seven "signs" (wonderous deeds) that point to the divinity of Jesus. These signs have added meaning. For example, in the "second sign, the cure of the royal official's son (Jn 4:46-54) simply by the word of Jesus at a distance, signifies the power of Jesus' life-giving word." (USCCB - United States Conference of Catholic Bishops online Introduction to the Gospel of John)

You are familiar with the many teachings of Jesus that are found in the synoptic Gospels. For example, we learned that in *Matthew*, there are four fairly long monologues with Jesus teaching on many subjects. These subjects often address how we are to live. *John* doesn't say nearly as much about how we are to live, nor do we hear Jesus teaching very much. What we do hear is why we should pay attention to Jesus. We learn why he has authority to teach. The USCCB's Introduction also asserts that this Gospel author "seems to take pains to show that women are not inferior to men." (Just a tidbit for the Ladies' Sodality.)

Join us as we explore eight video lessons from the *Gospel of John*, beginning on Tuesday, February 21, from 5:45--7 PM in St. Charles Hall. There will not be a class during Holy Week.

This will replace our regular scripture study which will return after the last of these classes. There is no charge for this discussion; however, anyone who would like a personal copy of the workbook can order it from me or directly from DynamicCatholic.com. The workbook cost is \$15.95. Please make checks payable to Blessed Trinity and let me know by February 5 if you want us to order for you.

In February, Pope Francis prays that parishes, placing communion at the center, may increasingly become communities of faith, fratemity and welcome towards those most in need.
